The Oh, Jonah Musical!

Some 350 were in the pews on Sunday, April 28, when the **Wesley-Knox Junior Choir** presented its rollicking musical, Oh, Jonah! Everyone knew, of course, that in the story, Jonah would be swallowed by a whale, but they soon found out there was much more to the story than that!

This story comes to us from a time when people still thought of God as a god of requirements and rewards, granting good health and prosperity to the righteous and sending misfortune to those falling short of God's mark. In the story, God asks Jonah to go to Nineveh, the "city of sin", to warn its people of God's unhappiness and get them to repent. Jonah balks, gets on a ship and heads for Tarshish instead. When a storm hits the ship, Jonah accepts the blame and lets the crew throw him overboard. God saves Jonah by sending a whale (actually the Bible says "a big fish") that swallows him and later coughs him up onto dry land.

In part two of the story, Jonah reluctantly goes to Nineveh to warn the Ninevites of God's impending wrath. He calls on them to repent. Surprisingly, they do so. But Jonah is not happy. He would rather God had punished them and he sits under a tree and pouts. God then has a few words with him and he comes around to God's way of thinking. At least, he does in the musical! In the Bible, the story actually ends a bit abruptly here...

It's a great story of course, and very much about our human stubbornness, irresponsibility, and tendency to be more concerned with being right than being compassionate. But mostly, it's about our inability—try hard as we might—to run away from God and God's love for all people including those who are different from us.

That certainly came through in the musical! Congratulations to the leads: Christian Haworth (Jonah), Owen Spicer (the captain), and Book Kimber-Johnson (the king). Also to the six angels (Did anyone notice a resemblance to Charlie's Angels of 1970s television fame?), apprentice angel Rev. Tracy who came in at the end, and to Karen Pincombe who directed the show, Karen Schuessler who directed the music, Mary-Bee Haworth and choir parents who looked after costumes and a dozen other things, Brian Ratcliffe who played the piano, Linda Imrie who designed and created the set, and all the members of the Junior Choir who sang and acted with such energy and beauty. A real Wesley-Knox team effort!—HJM

May 26: Come to an Evening with Dr. David Galston

Ever wonder what Jesus was like as a person? On Sunday, May 26, at 7:30 pm, come and hear **Dr. David Galston** who will be speaking on his new book, **Embracing the Human Jesus**. David, ecumenical chaplain at Brock University in St. Catharines, Jesus scholar and member of the Jesus Seminar, is one of North America's foremost authorities on the historical Jesus.

A few notes on David's thinking about Jesus. David is pretty sure that, whatever else Jesus was or became in the minds of his followers, Jesus at least started out as a wisdom teacher. And he was a lot edgier than most of us think. Consider the Beatitudes. In the King James Bible and most translations that followed, the Greek is usually rendered as "Blessed are..." or "Fortunate are...". But scholars like David have discovered, among the rich set meanings of the original Greek, that "Congratulations to..." is a much more accurate translation. Try reading the Beatitudes this way: "Congratulations to the poor in spirit! Heavens's domain belongs to them! Congratulations to those who grieve! They will be consoled! Congratulations to the gentle! They will inherit the earth! Congratulations to those who hunger and thirst for justice! They will have a feast!" Much edgier!



David also believes that Jesus had a wicked sense of humour. The Parable of the Lost Sheep seems simple enough. A shepherd leaves his ninety-nine sheep to search for the one sheep that is lost. Upon finding his lost sheep, he brings his friends together and throws a party. It's just like God rejoicing when a lost soul returns to God. But the party is a kicker. These are shepherds and in Jesus' culture, party meant food. What do you suppose would be the first item on their menu? So now, what does this parable actually mean? Or consider Jesus' suggestion that, if someone takes your coat, you should give him your shirt as well. Jesus lived in a two-garment society. That's all they wore in Jesus' time and place—a coat and a long undershirt. None of this would have been lost on Jesus' audience. We're sure you get the picture too!

Again, come and hear David. In 2011, he was the highest-rated speaker at the Widen the Embrace Progressive Christianity Conference. He is a wonderful teacher and an engaging, entertaining speaker with nothing but the utmost admiration and respect for Jesus. You will learn much. Freewill offering only.—HJM

South Sudan: Next Steps and William Ater

Since the return of the **Journey with South Sudan** mission team at the end of January, our Mission and Service Committee has been working diligently to set priorities and develop further long-term strategies for its ongoing outreach projects involving our Wesley-Knox congregation. On May 5, at a special meeting, members of our committee met with members of the 2013 Journey with South Sudan team to share these strategies and ask for input and ideas. Significant in our discussions: the fact that Canadian Aid for Southern Sudan (CASS) uses all the donations it receives to directly fund projects. Unlike many other overseas-aid organizations, administration in Canada is totally handled by unpaid volunteers. In South Sudan, however, day-to-day oversight and fulfillment of CASS programs is handled by William Ater—a very competent and compassionate citizen of that new country. To those of us who had the honour of meeting William during our visit, it was evident that without his presence there, things would simply not be happening as effectively or efficiently as they do. Given the team's first-hand knowledge, the unanimous consensus was that the outreach project we would recommend to Wesley-Knox for



2013 would be to raise \$3000 to directly support William Ater in his role as CASS point person in South Sudan. Please read on so that you too will have an opportunity to know William's story and find out what a truly amazing man he is...

Once you spend time with William Ater—Canadian Aid for Southern Sudan's point-person on the ground—you quickly realize you've never met anyone quite like him before. In his 30s, he's dignified with a maturity beyond his years. Listening to his life story, you gain a quick understanding of where the depth of his commitment comes from.

Born during some of the most brutal days of the civil war between northern and southern Sudan, William's father was an officer in the rebel army fighting for its survival. When his father was killed in battle, the conflict being particularly brutal in his area, William was forced to flee with a large number of boys. Thus began his remarkable odyssey.

With his mother dead from starvation, William teamed up with others to seek protection in the only place available at the time—Ethiopia, hundreds of kilometres to the east. The journey was arduous, with many of the boys killed by raiders or lions. Eventually they made it to Ethiopia, where they were forced into the life of child soldiers. As difficult as it was, William was still able to acquire an education.

Eventually William wanted to return to his home in southern Sudan to help his people. He ended up walking all the way back. It was then, in 1999, that Jane Roy and Glen Pearson met William, on their very first trip to what is now South Sudan. Young William was hired as an interpreter in their fight to free slaves and he became an indispensable member of each Canadian team that journeyed to southern Sudan. The war was now raging everywhere and William took many risks to bring women and children back from slavery in the north.

Jane and Glen were asked by southern leaders to assist in educating and rehabilitating former slaves. They launched Canadian Aid for Southern Sudan (CASS) specifically to fulfill that purpose. William became an essential part of their efforts.

Although CASS was funding and supporting numerous programs on the ground in southern Sudan, it soon became clear that hiring a local leader to guide and sustain CASS initiatives would be essential to their success. In the community's mind, William was the obvious choice. Although he had been asked to take the role of local commissioner and was a popular favourite to become the region's Member of Parliament, he turned down each opportunity, saying that he simply wanted to oversee development projects that would directly assist his people. The respect he earned for that decision made him the clear choice to become CASS's person on the ground.

The Canadian side of CASS is entirely volunteer with all funds donated to CASS going directly to on-the-ground programs in South Sudan. But, although the organization takes large teams to South Sudan each January, the need for a full-time employee to guide programs when the teams are not there is paramount. Initiatives like scholarships, water projects, the purchase of goats, and microenterprise efforts would not be possible without William's clear leadership. As CASS's only employee, the role he plays is pivotal, not only to the South Sudanese but also to our Canadian image in the region.

With the Republic of South Sudan now the world's newest nation, a new generation of leadership that will guide that country from war to a strong and lasting peace is essential. William has vowed to be part of the future of South Sudan. In recognition of his key importance to the region, CASS funded William to take university courses in Uganda. He has now graduated—a remarkable accomplishment in an area that hardly has any high schools.

For CASS to be truly effective and for donations to CASS to have their largest reach, supporting William will ensure that CASS projects, funded by the generosity of Canadians, will be well managed, not only in oversight, but in the care and compassion of a people only now learning the blessings of peace.—Sheila LeClair
